



## Contexte historique

Cet ouvrage, écrit par Henry James Morgan, écrivain, avocat, fonctionnaire et éditeur connu pour sa Bibliotheca Canadensis, présente le portrait de plus de 350 femmes ayant marqué l'histoire canadienne entre le 17<sup>e</sup> et le 20<sup>e</sup> siècle.

Ce livre se situe au croisement de l'encyclopédie et de la biographie. Organisée en ordre alphabétique, une photo de chacune des actrices historiques accompagne les présentations biographiques. Il s'agit du premier ouvrage du genre publié au Canada et constitue ainsi un document important sur l'histoire des femmes au Canada et du rôle que celles-ci ont joué dans le développement du pays. Si la majorité des femmes présentes sont mariées et issues des classes aisées, l'auteur s'intéresse par ailleurs à la vie de certaines artistes canadiennes qui ont fait carrière dans des domaines non conventionnels tels la musique, le cinéma et l'écriture.
